From Revd. Simon

Whether we pause to remember at All Souls those who have recently died or at Christmas ache for those who we miss at family gatherings the ending of the year can be for many a poignant time.

Yet the Collect for All Saints at the beginning of November reminds us that we need to see creation and time through faith in God. "Almighty God, you have knit together your elect in one communion and fellowship in the mystical body of your Son Christ our Lord."

What this prayer is emphasizing is that as a community both those who have gone before and those presently alive exist in one body awaiting God's salvation through Jesus Christ. We are knit together through faith in a living God who will transform us through a new beginning. Advent is the herald for this change in human history, God is coming, to be manifest in the form of a human being (incarnate) born of a women and through the most horrible death suffer the ending of life that all of us at some point will experience. Yet we are called to be children of God (Saints) to believe in this person of Jesus Christ to share in God's redemptive love. In the physical and emotional darkness of this time of year in the bleakness of winter a message of hope is proclaimed.

We cannot know what our own earthly futures will look like or how long each one of us has as allotted time. The current pandemic makes looking into the future even more uncertain than normal, but God promises through Jesus that his love of each one of us is real, not just us now and in the future but the whole company of Saints. To be a Saint means literally being God's holy one. Followers of Jesus during the time of Saint Paul were simply called 'saints'. In Philippians 3.12 we read that we can become Holy not simply through our own actions but through Jesus Christ. Let us as we grapple with our faith seek to be transformed into radiant holiness through our faith in Jesus. Even if access to our churches is limited, our singing curtailed, celebrating Christmas may not happen in church but rather on line, yet our faith in Jesus remains undiminished and we can shine with the Saints of yesterday and today in the love and hope of Jesus Christ. Let us cast off the darkness for as St John proclaims, "I In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. 2 He was in the beginning with God. 3 All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being 4 in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. 5 The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it."

Let us proclaim the coming of the light and end being prisoners to darkness.

Prayer & healing ministry.

Since 1988 a team of 5 lay people and 2 ordained have taken part in Diocesan Training and are authorised to Minister in services for Healing. Reverend Sharran Ireland is chaplain, under the authority of our Vicar. We follow the Benefice Safeguarding and GDPR regulations.

We have been meeting on the first Friday of the month in St. Mary of Charity. During lockdown have been meeting on Zoom.

In a recent report for the APCM, Roz Graham, a founding member of our Healing Ministry Team, and Formation Guardian Canterbury Area Third Order Society of Saint Francis wrote:

The ministry is open to everyone. Healing is a process of growing towards a greater wholeness of body, mind and spirit.

It may be the curing of a variety of physical ailments.

Healing may be the curing of emotional wounds, hurts from the past and of the memory of these. Healing may be the putting right of relationships that have gone wrong, not only with each other, but also with God.

We receive healing through Holy Communion; through the laying on of hands; through anointing with holy oils; by becoming more open to God; through confessing our sins; being prepared to forgive others and to love one another as we would be loved; through faith in God. None of this can be achieved without PRAYER.

Our prayers can never replace seeing your doctor. Taking

everything to God in Prayer in addition to seeing your doctor is what we as Christians are instructed to do. The Bible also tells us in James 5:14" Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord." Should you require a prayer said for yourself, for another or a particular situation, you are welcome to email: healingprayerteam@yahoo.com any time prior to the first Friday in

the month.
Please Note:

- you must confirm in your email that, if the person to be prayed for is not you, you have their permission to pass on their name.
- we do not need to know the circumstances of the person, simply a name will be sufficient and no need for surnames either.
- Examples of what you might say are:
- "please pray for X who has given their permission for me to ask for prayer"
- "please pray for all who are isolated at this time"

We pray confidentially so that nothing is discussed outside our prayer meeting, unless we are asked to send the name to our Vicar.



Getting to know you

Hello, my name is Patrick [Mulcahy] and I worship at St. Peter and St. Paul, Ospringe in the Benefice of Faversham.

How long have you lived in Faversham, have you ever lived anywhere else?

Sue and I and our two children arrived in Faversham in 1976 when I was employed as a careers adviser in the Medway Towns. We soon found a spiritual home at the Baptist church where we worshipped until 2001. Here I served as deacon, youth worker and treasurer. I also had the privilege of serving as Town, Borough Councillor and Town mayor. In 2001 we half moved to East Wittering in Sussex and worshipped at St. Anne's where I served as Church Warden, server and trained as lay minister of Holy Communion. We retained a cottage in Ospringe and worshiped occasionally at St Peter and St Paul. In 2013 we moved to the Midlands to be near our daughter and family. While there we worshiped at St Margaret of Antioch were I was a church warden, sacristan and editor of the church magazine. In 2019 we returned to Faversham and continued to worship regularly at St Peter and St Paul Ospringe.

How did you come to your faith?

In the mid-sixties I moved school and met Sue who invited me to her Baptist Youth Group. That was the start of the spiritual journey which was to take me to Kingston Baptist Church, Coventry Baptist Church, Hempstead Rd Baptist Church in Birmingham (where I made my declaration of faith), Laindon Baptist Church (Essex) and Kings Rd Baptist Church Reading.

What do you like most about your home church?

I love the people, the music and the sense that prayer has been offered here over the centuries.

Architecturally, I like the mosaics and the stained glass windows which all tell a story. I enjoy the peace of the churchyard, with the trees and the wonderful shapes.

What's your favourite hymn or chorus?

Difficult to choose. Fullerton's, 'I cannot tell why He who angels worship' which finishes 'At last the Saviour of the World is King!' set to the tune Londonderry.

W. C. Smith's, 'Immortal Invisible God only wise' particularly verse 4 'take the veil from our faces, the veil from our heart'.

Graham Kendrick's, 'The Servant King' particularly verse 4 'So let us learn how to serve, and in our lives enthrone Him; each other's needs to prefer, for it is Christ we are serving.'

What is your favourite bit of the Bible and why?

Where can I start? I am currently reading Genesis and will take one phrase from Genesis 3 v8 'That evening they heard the Lord God walking in the garden and they hid from him among the trees. But the Lord God called out to the man where are you?'

God has been seeking human kind since creation and continues to do so. We only have to respond to his call.

Some information on a rather forgotten group.

Some suggestions for our practical response. There are 300,000 children at present with a parent in prison. This is a forgotten and ignored group of children - when people are sentenced to prison, their children are not taken into consideration.

Prisoners' Children

When a parent is taken into prison, particularly when it is the mother, it has an enormous effect on the child. Each child loses their stability and their security, the family often becomes poorer, the children may be taken into care. The effects of the prison sentence are devastating and lifelong, including lower life expectancy - most of these children will die before the age of 65. Very few children are better off because their parent is in prison.

Covid-19 has been really harmful. The children have lost the little contact they did have with the parent in prison. For many of them its been like a bereavement. They've been worried that they will never see their parent again. Some haven't even been able to speak on the phone with the parent. They are having mental health issues, some have stopped eating even very young children.

Many children have little opportunity to share their problems. Their carer may be as stressed as they are. Often their school does not know they have a parent in prison; either shame or fear of bullying stops them telling anyone. They tend to be lonely and isolated.

69% of children with a parent in prison will themselves go to prison at some point in their life.

What can we do?

1. Pray for these children.

Especially pray that families will

stay together while the parent is in prison, to prevent the further consequences of family breakdown.

2. Support Angel Tree. This has been set up in prisons by the Christian organisation Prison Fellowship, to enable prisoners to send a present with a hand written card to their child/ children at Christmas. The prisoner chooses a present, which a prison fellowship volunteer will buy, wrap up with the prisoner's card and, if the parent wishes, a Christian book, and send to the child. The scheme is designed to keep families together and it reduces the chances of prisoners reoffending.

The scheme also enables young offenders to send a card and a small present to their mum or adult female carer on Mother's Day.

Angel Tree makes such an unbelievable difference to the life of children of prisoners. The genius is its simplicity. It happens unobtrusively, and is simple to engage with.

A prison visitor reported 'listening to the men in prison talking about how fantastic the scheme is and how much the children benefited from it, is incredible.'

At Davington we are making a collection for Angel Tree during the next couple of weeks, but if people wanted to contribute, the money could go at any time. PF want to make a special effort this year because of the effects of C19.

Life Behind Bars

'Millions face fresh Lock Down restrictions' read the headline. During this pandemic lots of people will have felt imprisoned in their own home. Unable to venture out and dependent on the kindness of others for supplying some of life's essentials while remaining lonely and isolated. Not very different from the 90,000 or so serving prison sentences across the country.

Last month churches and other organisations will have observed 'Prisoner's Week' which focuses on the help and support that those on the 'outside' can give. There are some people who become Prison Visitors, volunteers who will visit and befriend prisoners, and write letters to them or for them. They try and support their families too. 'Come you that are blessed by my Father' said Jesus 'inherit the kingdom prepared for you...for I was hungry and you gave me food.....I was in prison and you visited me'.

(Matthew 25: 34-36). Then there are those called to become Prison Chaplains.

Our former vicar Anthony Oehring became one when he left us, while Nick Ash, well known to many of us, is serving as the Prison Chaplain of HMP Elmley on the Isle of Sheppey. It is both a challenging and rewarding work as I found, becoming a part time chaplain in retirement.

The Rev. Paul Cowley, himself an ex prisoner, now the Bishop' Advisor for Prisons writes 'I have seen thousands of men changed by being embraced by the church'.

Across the world there are also those imprisoned unjustly who have committed no crime. Those who have stood up for their faith and suffer persecution because of their brave witness and courage in speaking out against evil and corruption.

The German pastor Dietrich
Bonnhoeffer was imprisoned then
martyred after standing up against
Hitler and his Nazi regime. In the
Bible, we read of some of the
heroes of the Faith being
imprisoned too, Joseph, John the
Baptist, Peter the Apostle and St
Paul, many of whose epistles were
written within prison walls.

Prisoner's Week has come and gone, but we can still pray for all those involved in prison ministry, not forgetting Nick Ash. They need our prayers as do prisoners and their families. Many meet with God while 'inside', hearts are softened, the Holy Spirit brings about new birth and the joy of forgiveness. Often talents blossom as new skills are acquired. Some become artists, writers and poets, all preparing for a fresh start when their release day arrives.
