Angel Tree 2021

Angel Tree is a scheme in prisons organised by Prison Fellowship. It was set up to give prisoners the opportunity to send a Christmas present to their child or children.

The effect is enormous when a parent, particularly the mother, is taken into prison. Children lose stability and security, the family often becomes poorer, the children may be taken into care.

Covid-19 has meant children have lost the little contact they did have with the parent. For many of them it's been like a bereavement. Some haven't been able to speak on the phone with the parent. They are having mental health issues.

Many children have little opportunity to share their problems. Their carer may be as stressed as they are. Often their school does not know they have a parent in prison. They fear bullying and tend to be lonely and isolated.

69% of children with a parent in prison will themselves go to prison at some point in their life.

Prisoners can suggest a suitable present they would like to send to their child. They, write a gift tag to go with it and members of Prison Fellowship then buy, wrap and send the present. The prisoner can include a suitable Christmas story book. (The gift tag often becomes a prized possession of the child!)

A chaplain in a woman's prison wrote

"The women prisoners are always moved as they write the gift tag. Often they are able to listen on the phone to their children opening the gift on Christmas Day."

The chaplain also said that many of the residents had previously benefited from Angel Tree and wanted to give something back, so throughout the Autumn prisoners had tithed a portion of their income to contribute to Angel Tree. (many prisoners work in the prison to earn some money)

The total was matched by the prison. That is how valuable the scheme is to both prisoners and the prison.

For most of the last 18 months there has been no prison visiting, so last year Angel Tree provided a wonderful opportunity for the residents to connect with their children.

Apparently one man was in tears when he shared with the chaplain the phone call he'd had with his children and the Christmas card they had sent him. He said 'Pastor, I'm so glad you knocked on my door that day, thank you.'

Another prisoner who wrote to Prison Fellowship to express his thanks for Angel Tree said "My kids loved the things you sent them, so from the bottom of my heart I love what you do for my kids at Christmas. Thank you so much."

It costs \pounds 20 to send a gift to a child. All the money comes from people like us.

At Davington we are making a collection for Angel Tree during the next couple of weeks and our donations will go to the prisons on Sheppey. Please contact me if you would like to join with this.

However, if you would like to make a general contribution, the money could go at any time; search online for Prison Fellowship Angel Tree, and you will find more information.



Experience Christmas—Helpers needed

Experience Christmas

I know it's only November, but I am very excited to tell you about Experience Christmas and our opportunity to offer it to our local schools (in the church nearest to each school) during the first week of December.

What is it?

Experience Christmas an absolutely wonderful and moving school/church engagement activity. It is a great experience for pupils and also for the staff, parents and volunteers who take part. Developed by the Diocese of Gloucester, it is aimed at KS2 - Years 3-6 (that's ages 7ish-11ish) and it also ticks boxes for schools in terms of SMSC (Social, Moral, Spiritual & Cultural) development.

What happens?

A class of 30(ish) arrives and after a short welcome, we all watch a 5-minute edited version of the lovely 2006 film "The Nativity Story".

Then, in five small groups, the class travels round five simple, scripted, interactive activities based on parts of the Christmas story.

These immersive activities last for about 10 minutes for each group and are led by church volunteers. A verse from In the bleak midwinter is played to indicate when to direct the group to the next activity. After each group has visited all five activities we all meet at the manger where we give our "gifts" to Jesus and sing the final verse of In the bleak midwinter and other songs so they are singing on their way back to school carrying details about our benefice Christmas events while enjoying a small chocolate Christmas pudding.

How long does Experience Christmas take?

For the school, the whole activity can take 90 minutes depending on arrival and departure times. For volunteers, the whole session can take between 2 - 2.5 hours including a prayer and briefing/debrief before and afterwards.

This 2.5 hour window allows for the classes' walking time and differences in their timetable. Therefore, sessions can look something like this:

- Morning sessions: Volunteers arrive: 9.00am | Class arrives: 9.30am | Class departs: 11.00am | Volunteers depart: 11.30am
- Afternoon sessions: Volunteers arrive: 12.30pm | Class arrives: 1.00pm | Class departs: 2.30pm | Volunteers depart: 3.00pm

Please would you consider being part of this?

We need a minimum of 6 DBSed volunteers for each session:

- Five volunteers to lead the five simple and scripted activities. If people prefer to lead an activity in pairs, that works well too (but we can't run the session without 5 activity leaders)
- Volunteers to travel round the activities with the small groups of pupils if there aren't enough teachers/parents to accompany every small group.
- Volunteers to provide the adults with tea/coffee/hot chocolate in covered cups while in the church.
 I have generally found that teachers discourage churches giving children drinks due to spillages and toilet time!

Signing up is REALLY easy!

Taizé Service for Advent

Sunday 28th November at 3.30pm

St Mary Magdalene & St Lawrence with St John the Evangelist, Davington.



Taizé is a tiny village hidden away in the hills of Burgundy, in the eastern part of France not far from the town of Cluny. Since 1940 it has been the home of an ecumenical community of brothers led originally by the late Brother Roger.

Their prayer, three times a day, is at the centre of their life. Today, Taizé is a place to which visitors of all ages and backgrounds go on pilgrimage, to participate in international meetings of prayer and reflection and music helps with both these aspects.

The use of some simple words in basic Latin to support the music and the theme of prayer was dictated by pastoral needs. From practical experience using Latin was the only way of solving the unavoidable problem of languages that arose at international gatherings as it belongs to no particular group and therefore puts everyone on an equal footing. Its pronunciation is not difficult and their repetitive nature and simple tunes mean they are easy for all to follow.

With this in mind we are creating the kind of atmosphere you might experience in Taizé here in Faversham, holding a service based on Taizé on Advent Sunday afternoon at 3.30pm in Davington Church as a pre-curser to this year's Contemplating Christmas series (more about the latter. elsewhere). We do hope you will be able to join us there where we will sing mainly in English but perhaps with the odd chant in Latin too.
