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I find it hard as I grow older not to become more cynical about various things within the world around me. Why are there long waits for health treatment, potholes seem to be getting worse, it is far too easy for this list to continue. Yet as I walked out of the Almshouse chapel from taking a monthly

service this morning my heart was

lifted by the sight of Cherry

Blossom.

In a cold and often questioning world, nature continued in its uninterrupted cycle producing beauty in God's created order.

As Lent approaches we are preparing as a Benefice to gather resources for Lenten reflection which are included in this edition of Keeping Connected.

On a personal note, I will seek to refocus on the calling of Jesus, which is at the heart of all Christian pilgrimage through life. I pause to reflect on the calling of Philip and Nathanael in John 1. 43 – 51. As Nathanael asks "Nazareth! Can anything good come from there?" Clearly another cynical individual, yet in meeting Jesus his life is transformed with light and hope. Together both Philip and Nathanael respond to the good news of Jesus, from where they are in the place Jesus finds them.

Lenten journey requires us to be honest and open with ourselves and with Jesus, if we are to seek to draw closer to him who calls us by name.

In the Lectionary through Lent the main reading for the Epistle is from Paul's letter to the Romans. If you are overly busy or unable to venture out to join a group can I recommend: For Everyone, Bible Study Guides, Romans by Tom Wright. Published by SPCK. Alternatively, Dust and Glory is the Church of England's Lent campaign for 2023. Offering 40 daily reflections for Lent on faith, failure and forgiveness, it invites you to find God in the mess of everyday life. Each week it considers the idea of failure from a different angle and explores the difference God's redeeming work in Jesus makes to the struggles of

Rev. Dan writes,

After a very busy and engaging Autumn and Christmas in terms of benefice mission, thank you and well done for all you make happen to show God's Kingdom in action and his unstoppable love.

December's Experience Christmas was very well received involving 230 primary pupils across six of our local schools. It's very engaging and moving for pupils, staff and volunteers as it immerses all those involved in the Christmas story. We're now planning to deliver the very similar Experience Easter for March. If you'd like to be involved, please do let me know.

Singalong Christmas was a great success with some regulars and new people in the cast and audience. The rehearsals are very often described as being more than just rehearsals - high points in the week - which are missed between Singalong seasons. We aim to start rehearsing for Singalong Easter on Saturday 25th February aiming to perform this on Holy Saturday.

In October we launched a new weekly benefice service called i.wonder. Based at Davington Church on Sundays at 4.00pm i.wonder provides a space for children, young people and adults to worship God, grow faith and explore discipleship all together through art, craft, discussion, drama, prayer, songs, cakes and games. There are no separate groups for certain ages and we follow the same themes as we explore in the morning services. Some are used to church, but some are very new to the whole church experience. My thanks to the team and congregation for their energy and creativity.

Our Gem youth trailer has been regularly out and about through the Autumn engaging children and young people in activities and conversation at Bensted Grove on Tuesday afternoons, Davington Top Park on Wednesday afternoons and at either Selling or Sheldwich on Friday afternoons. With Vibe (BrogdaleCIC's youth organisation) we've introduced an early evening Market Square provision on Fridays followed by our usual visit to Faversham Rec from 7.00-9.00pm. We've also been delivering activities in other areas in Faversham during this early evening session this year. We'll be at Faversham Market on Saturday 11th February.



Banners advertising Faversham Gems Awards are up around Faversham. Last year we celebrated over 90 children and young people who have Gone Extra Miles and have made life sparkle, celebrating where people have given of themselves, their gifts and talents, their time, energy and kindness to benefit others. This is the going-the-second-mile stuff that Jesus encourages that makes life good. So who do you know between 5-19 who you could nominate at favershamgems.org?

As well as all our weekly engagement with pupils and staff in our local schools and other wonderful activities in the benefice thanks for all that is happening to communicate God's unstoppable love for everyone through words and actions.

About Lent

On 22nd February we will celebrate Ash Wednesday. For Christians Ash Wednesday begins the six week period known as Lent. This leads up to Palm Sunday, Holy Week and Easter Sunday.

Lent is a 40-day season marked by repentance, fasting and reflection. The 40-days reflect Christ's time in the wilderness, where he fasted and was tempted by Satan but robustly resisted.

There is no mention of Ash Wednesday in the Bible. But there is a tradition of donning ashes as a sign of penitence that predates Jesus. For example we read In the Old Testament, in the book of Jonah that eventually the people of Nineveh repented and showed that by fasting and wearing sackcloth and ashes, and there are other references to this kind of showing of repentance in other Old Testament books among them. Isaiah. Job Esther and Jeremiah.

So on Ash Wednesday we begin by going into Church to repent of our sins and show this by having an ash cross placed on our forehead as a reminder.

The days that follow traditionally are days of fasting, of giving up pleasures of all kinds as penance, for those sins.

When we are asked we are giving up for Lent we often list alcohol, chocolate, cakes and the like? But do these really help us to understand Jesus' example of resisting temptation, when many of us so easily give up and are tempted once again to indulge?

We are all tempted, perhaps daily, to do something we know we shouldn't. It might be something minor like eating some one's last chocolate or hiding something from someone. What about those little white lies which trip off the tongue so easily? Or it may be something more serious, something we might do without even thinking but which has really upset some-one else, put them down or in a difficult position.

We all make wrong decisions. So how do we deal with those things when we realise we've made a mistake, or perhaps the bigger question is how do we stop ourselves from doing them all together?

Well, each period of Lent gives us the opportunity to set aside a time to focus on how Christ dealt with those things in his life. His ministry and sacrifice.

So why not give a little time each day or perhaps simply each week of Lent to thinking and praying about how you might resist your temptations? Reflect on how you might develop your relationship with our Lord in preparation for the time when we meet him on the road into Jerusalem on his way to the cross and beyond?

to release the prisoner,


to rebuild the nations,

Ospringe Church and ley lines.



I was reading an old copy of Bygone Kent when an article 'Leys and Church alignments in East Kent' caught my eye. The author, a D. Burridge claimed the existence of a series of ley lines in East Kent using Church locations. Burridge concluded by suggesting other lines in Kent were waiting to be discovered. So, taking this cue I consulted my Ordnance Survey map number 178 with ruler to hand to see if our part of Kent might feature.

Well blow me down! I quickly discovered three potential lines using Churches:

- 1. Hartlip Borden Rodmersham Norton.
- 2. Burham Stockbury Lynsted.
- 3. Bearsted Wormshill Kingsdown.

All three lines were virtually straight. But most exciting of all however, was that all three lines converged on Ospringe Church. Had I stumbled on a significant discovery?

Going back into the mists of time, did Ospringe Church have some long-forgotten importance within this part of Kent? It was time to research further into Ley Lines and their significance.

It seemed the existence of Ley Lines was first discovered in the 1920s when a Mr Alfred Watkins put forward the theory that ancient monuments and Churches were often laid out along straight lines which stretched for miles across the countryside. They served as a guide and benefit to travelling traders.

I dismissed this last bit as false.

As a former long-distance hiker I knew only too well it is impossible to walk in a straight line across England for any sort of distance. There are simply too many natural hazards to negotiate, like mountains, bogs, rivers to cross, lakes, impenetrable forests.

When encountering any of these, the walker simply goes round these meaning his linear walk route from A to B swerves to the left and right. The 'straight line' route just doesn't normally happen

Out of my fifteen long distance hikes, I can only recollect one stretch of straight track and that was the Peddars Way in Norfolk. And yes I know the Romans built straight roads and tracks, but these were built by the Romans for their purposes and didn't utilise existing ancient monuments to mark out their route.

At the time, the Watkins theory had plenty of critics and was then largely forgotten, only to be revived in the 1960s when an astonishing new theory was put forward by the counter cultural Earth Mysteries movement. They argued leys were established by pre-historic communities to guide alien space craft. Wow! So, stand by to welcome U.F.Os. in the meadow next to Ospringe Church.

Normally I've always been a bit of a sceptic on this sort of thing, and yet you couldn't argue against the existence of the three lines of Churches I'd plotted. It was worth remembering also that many Church sites were built on ancient sacred sites. So, something in the spaceship guidance theory?

It was further research however that settled things for me. Mathematical experts pointed out that identifying straight lines of things on a map are predictable, provided there are enough of them. Round-a-bouts, golf courses, caravan sites could all probably be found in straight lines if you looked hard enough.

Critics had discovered straight lines of telephone boxes, pizza restaurants, and closed Woolworth stores amongst others. I put this to the test and consulted my historical map of Kent railways. Sure enough, I quickly found a straight line of stations:

Leysdown - Faversham - Ashford - Appledore.

I concluded Ley Lines are a classic case of red herrings in historical search. Yes, they exist on maps if you care to look but they have no meaning or significance. Nevertheless, I will still glance across to the meadow at Ospringe once in a while for a possible U.F.O. sighting just in case!

The supper was hosted by the Baptist Church, and supported by very generous donations from the Preston, Davington and Catholic Churches.






These provided little gifts and chocolates to all the children and their parents. And we had the most amazing St Nicholas!
