
- From Rev. Simon
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We Celebrate with St Paul, the church in Corinth to whom he is writing in his first letter to the church in Corinth and all Christians across the globe of

the resurrection of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. The once and for all redemption of humanity comes through his sacrifice upon the cross on Good Friday, and our salvation by his resurrection on Easter Day.

How often do we worry about matters related to spiritual challenge and forget that Christ has already won the victory on that first Easter, overcoming death or as St Paul writes, "24 Then the end will come, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father after he has destroyed all dominion, authority and power. 25 For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. 26 The last enemy to be destroyed is death. 27 For he "has put everything under his feet." 1 Corinthians 15.24-27.

We follow Christ who has already won the battle for us, our sins are forgiven by his sacrifice on our behalf. But we seem to want to live as if there is no spiritual hope. We ask



ourselves if only our church communities, could be more well attended, if parish share was less, if yet Christ has already won the

<u>victory</u>, his death and resurrection is a once and for all event if only we would believe in him who died for us or better still 'live out our lives' as we believed in him.

As Christians we come to celebrate the first Easter appearance to the followers of Jesus. Mary Magdalene representing all who mourn vising the grave, just as we visit the grave of a loved one. But for her and for us the story changed, death is no more, salvation is from Christ. But do we live in this hope, do our lives reflect the joyous good news of Easter?

As we celebrate this Easter all that God through Christ has done, may we reflect such Easter joy in our lives and our churches. The battle has been won; we are an Easter people lets behave as such.

Tribute to Reverend Penny Fenton (1941-2023)

Revd. Penny Fenton was a well-known and popular lady who was very active in the Faversham Community, inside and outside the Church. She lived in Faversham almost all her life, moving to Ospringe as a young child when her father was appointed as Headmaster of Ospringe Primary School. She grew up in Ospringe School House, together with her brother Michael and sister Stephanie, and in later life lived in Brogdale Road.

She studied for a Botany degree at Leicester University but her studies were cut short when she had to return home to care for her mother. She went into teaching, working her way up to Head of Science then Deputy Headteacher of Upbury Manor School in Gillingham. It was whilst taking children on school trips that she formed a lifelong friendship with her fellow teacher, Brian Wilson, who became her travelling companion.

Following her retirement from the teaching profession she was ordained as a priest on 29th September 1996 by Archbishop George Carey. She initially worked as a non-stipendiary priest in the Benefice of Ospringe with Eastling and Stalisfield. Following Rev. Douglas Turton's retirement, in 2001 she was appointed Priest in Charge of the Benefice. Although she only received a part-time stipend, her ministry was never less than full-time. She was particularly gifted in pastoral care and would think nothing of dropping everything to help a family in crisis.

After her retirement as Priest in Charge in the Benefice, she continued her ministry as a Chaplain at the Pilgrims Hospice and by taking services at local rural churches.

Her longstanding connection with many families in the community resulted in a steady stream of requests for her to take funerals, which she always tried to accommodate. She was a supporter to local charities, such as the Maison Dieu, of which she was a longstanding trustee.

She died after a short illness on 19th January 2023. Her funeral was held at Ospringe Church on 7th March 2023.

A packed church was testament to Penny's popularity and her positive influence on so many people's lives. She will be remembered for her care, compassion, warmth and occasional dry but gentle wit.

All 150 children and young people have Gone Extra Miles and have

made life sparkle for others and have therefore been nominated by the community.

The church will be packed with proud family and supporters as certificates and medals are presented by the Mayor of Faversham, Cllr Trevor Martin.

Some have asked me, why is it important for a Priest and Missioner to give time creating and running this?

Jesus taught the whole concept of going the second mile during his Sermon on the Mount (in Matthew 5.41).

Just as the original context was so not what anyone would want to do (Jesus' listeners would not have wanted to go extra miles for Romans Soldiers!), this is just as true today in our rather selfish "Survival of the Fittest" flavour of national and world society often modelled by those who set national policy.

However, society likes Jesus' concept of Going Extra Miles because it makes life glisten, producing so much good fruit that life tastes better. So, let's celebrate where this happens!

Since I started the Gem Awards in 2012 in Nottingham, many Gems Nominees have said they didn't realise they'd done anything special but feel encouraged to keep doing good.

will you nominate? sector of society which means we judge the young more harshly than adults often missing how children and young people contribute great things to society.

One only has to see the Gems Nominations this year and last

year or witness the amazing responses from children at Experience Easter sessions last week to see a very positive attitude that could transform the world – so much so that I often feel we'd do better as a nation and world if school pupils were (part of) the Government.

In between our two youth mobile sessions last Friday I was attacked in Preston Street when I couldn't get the trailer through due to cars parked on double yellow lines. Was it a teenager who attacked me?

No, it was all down to adults parked illegally.

I was fine albeit shaky and the Police and some others were very helpful (and there was a proud moment when the guy tried to take my phone but I grabbed it back!).

Immediately afterwards some young people asked if I was ok and there followed three massively important conversations where young people vowed to Go Extra Miles to make things right in their lives and in the lives of others even against the odds.

That's surely the society we want - modelled by young people and taught by Jesus.

God's creation is in trouble.

Antonio Guterres, the head of the United Nations says "We are firmly on track towards an unliveable world." The International Energy Agency said we can have no new fossil fuels after the end of 2021 – yes, 2021, that's not a misprint! Yet the UK government is giving tax breaks to oil companies to open up 100 plus new oil and gas fields. They have even

given the go ahead to a new coal mine – against the advice of their own advisors.

On 21-24 April a big rally is taking place around Westminster to demand an end to fossil fuels. The rally is being organised in conjunction with the police.

Many of those joining the witness will be Christians, people of faith. Jesus instructed us that we are "the salt of the earth" and "the light of the world." In participating in this mass protest, we bring our faithful communities into the space as salt, actively working as preservers and transformers in that secular space (and of that secular space), and as communities, even more than as individuals, we do so very visibly, giving light to everyone.

On the first day of the rally, Friday 21 April from 11am, the major Christian development and environmental NGOs are gathering in the gardens of St John's Church, Waterloo. At 12 noon we come together for an hour of prayers, songs and witness. Staff members from Christian Aid, Tearfund, Cafod, Green Christian, Operation Noah, Christian Climate Action and the Salvation Army are co-operating on preparing the Service.

When I survey the wondrous cross.

It is April and we celebrate death and renewal. It is a time when we reflect on Jesus his journey to Jerusalem, his agonies, despair, humiliation and death at the hands of the civil and religious power brokers of his day. The gospels cover his final hours in different ways giving different perspectives.

In Luke we read

'Then one of the criminals who were hanged blasphemed Him, saying, "If You are the Christ, save Yourself and us."

⁴⁰ But the other, answering, rebuked him, saying, "Do you not even fear God, seeing you are under the same condemnation? ⁴¹ And we indeed justly, for we receive the due reward of our deeds; but this Man has done nothing wrong." ⁴² Then he said to Jesus, "Lord, remember me when You come into Your kingdom."

⁴³ And Jesus said to him, "Assuredly, I say to you, today you will be with Me in Paradise"

I have often read this story and wondered what we can learn from it. I found a lovely book entitled 'Two Other Men' written by Graham Reeves who explores the meaning of the interaction and the two different responses of the criminals.

In the summary it says' Time and again ,Luke's gospel shows the mercy of God displayed through Jesus to those who feel themselves unworthy of love – does this final scene fully realise Luke's message? What do these interactions between two criminals tell us about God's love?

And what can we conclude about the impenitent criminal? It is a book about love and grace, and what stops us accepting the love of God.

Could our churches help people in debt?





- 1 in 8 HOMES ARE IN DEBT (November 2022)
- (November 2022)
 EVERY 4 MINUTES 1 PERSON
 IN BRITAIN BECOMES
 INSOLVENT/BANKRUPT (October 2022)
- It takes 1-3 years for people in debt to seek advice.
- Debt can happen to anyone.

Problem debt which people cannot manage causes misery. It may lead to relationship breakdown, addiction, fear, depression, suicide.

When we look at the above statistics it would seem likely that many people in Faversham are in debt. I am convinced that either as the Church of England or as Churches Together in Faversham, we should be setting up a debt advice centre in the town. This would complement the work of Citizens' Advice.

There are two charities which would help us to do this and give free advice to people in debt. They are Christians Against Poverty, CAP, and Community Money Advice, CMA. CAP works through churches to set up debt centres. It will provide the church with all the training and support needed to offer a professional debt counselling tool that is proven to help some of the most vulnerable in society. All the debt counselling is done centrally, including insolvency options, so the centre manager can focus on supporting clients spiritually and practically.

CMA provides all the resources, training and support needed to establish and maintain local free, face to face money advice services.

Both charities aim to bring clients out of debt and provide help and training so people can manage their resources and stay out of debt.

With both charities we would need to set up a centre and provide volunteers. Setting up the centre will incur costs. To spread these we would ideally involve as many churches as possible.
