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Revd. Simon writes

This Christmas - step into the flow of God's generosity.

God's gift of Himself (the incarnation) in Jesus coming at Christmas is the gift we celebrate. A gift freely given. Yet a gift that is so often forgotten by a material world.

At Christmas we often try and measure the amount we spend on gifts, what is the appropriate amount to spend on children, spouse, friends, distant relations. Each amount carefully measured in response to a collection of factors ranging from emotions, guilt, and our financial budget.

As we prepare to celebrate Christmas and welcome in 2022 our Bishop is asking us how we can live generous lives and make 2022 a year of living generously.

At Christmas we celebrate God's infinite generous giving in the gift of life, creation, and the giving of his Son. Whilst we celebrate all this, what is our personal response to God's generosity? Bishop Rose spoke of an aunt who each Saturday would prepare for church the next day; the best dress prepared hanging up, money placed ready for her gift on Sunday. All carefully thought through and made ready. An intentional act in preparation for worship the next day. Going before God prepared for worship, offering the first fruits, and offering him her very best.

If we are to live lives as 'intentional Christians', we first have to pause and realise that we live in the flow of God's

generosity. Do we appreciate what we have through God's grace or is it simply taken for granted? If we are to live generous lives in giving back in the love what we have received, we need to spend time in thinking what it is we have received from God. This Christmas and new year can we pause at the turning of the year and look at our lives and ponder what we have in our faith. Only in understanding this can we recognise what we are led to offer in gratitude to our church community and wider community through our gifts and talents.

The humility of the Christ child stands in stark contrast to the brash commercialism of Christmas. The joy of the angels, the humility of the shepherds and the wisdom of the kings stand contrast with our secularised holiday period. We say we wish to reclaim Christmas, yet do we begin by responding to God's generosity or is it easier being critical of how other people are behaving. This Christmas let us be aware of stepping into the flow of God's generosity and respond out of our love and seek to live out our lives generously. A happy Christmas and blessed and generous 2022.

Dan, writes

It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas.

My heart lifts when I see boxes of mince pies in the shops. I look forward to seeing Christmas decorations in the aisles just as those gruesome Hallowe'en outfits (thankfully) disappear. And is it ever too early to hear Noddy Holder's famous words, "It's Christmas!"?

The Church's Calendar is (generally) very helpful - mostly for people who attend church every week. However, while no one minds hearing any other Bible story or singing any other hymn at any time of year (even Easter stories and hymns), for some reason there is discomfort because of a tacit law that banishes Christmas stuff to only a few weeks in the year. God doesn't need a calendar as he is at his work all year round and so as Christians we're called to be Easter-People every day of the year, keeping in mind that the same power that raised Jesus to new life lives in us. Maybe, then, we ought to be Christmas-People (and Epiphany-People, Ascension-People etc) all year round too, to keep in mind how, in Jesus, God's Word became flesh living among us in our mess. It is a pity that we stuff into a few weeks, the whole Emmanuel-season: the matter of the mucky manger and reality of Jesus as homeless refugee - both demonstrating God's bias towards the vulnerable and his call to serve. Maybe centuries of churchiness have found these themes too uncomfortable to be an all-year-round thing.

Of course, Christmas seems less and less about Jesus as secular society insists it's all about Santa or elves on shelves. When I once playfully challenged this idea saying "erm, Christmas' true meaning is in the name!" I received the slightly ironic

postmodern retort, "actually Christmas is about anything anyone wants it to be about - so shut up about your Jesus stuff!" What they meant was anyone, apart from Christians, can make Christmas about what they like. It didn't surprise me a while ago when out on the streets filming responses to the question "what's the true meaning of Christmas?" someone said, "Oh Jesus Christ, I have no idea"! They couldn't see what was funny.

We prayerfully make Christmas about Christ, communicating the great news, in and out of season, that in Jesus, God lovingly moved into the neighbourhood, right where we are, in our mess. And, although liturgy often makes it sound like he's always elsewhere, God's still with us through his Spirit. Jesus' incarnational ministry (God with skin) is a demonstration of what our mission and ministry should look like too: being Jesus in messy neighbourhoods embodying God's love, peace, justice and mercy. With a message of hope this amazing, I wish it could be Christmas every day.

Then, I heard a soft twinkling sound, as he pulled out a BELL.

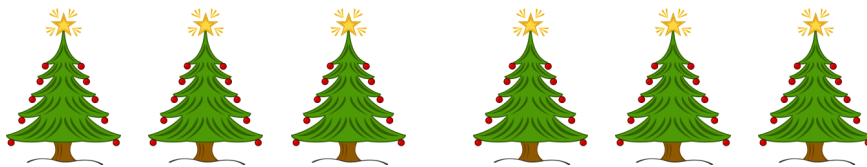
 **“Teach the children that as the lost sheep are found by the sound of the bell, it should ring mankind to the fold. The bell symbolises guidance and return.”**

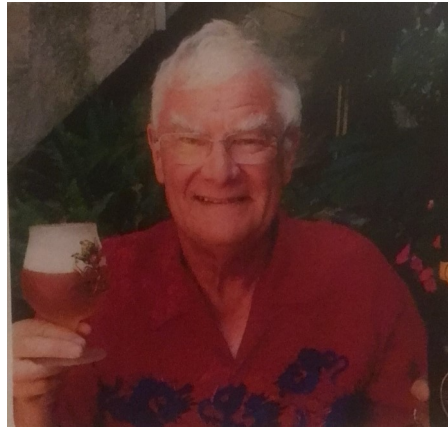

I still don't know how to condense my words about this wonderful man. He was 'one of a kind' & 'all things to all people' & everyone he met will have their own special memories.



Michael was a people person & warmth & generosity shone out of him. He was always curious to hear about other people's lives & his constant dialogue with God shaped his life.

We were so blessed when he & Sue joined us at Davington just at the right time to help the Reordering Project take shape. His energy & organisational skills were enthusiastically received although we did not realise just how much he also managed to give the local branches of Rotary & CAMRA (real ale was another passion).

He was such a shining light in the community, a clear example of how his Christian faith was fundamental to his whole being right until the end.

He reached out to everyone & up until the first lockdown he had led a Wednesday Pilgrim group where the depth of his faith, his general knowledge & his respect for all 'walks of life' was clearly appreciated by all who attended.

He was Deanery Synod Rep, Parish Secretary & PCC member with skilful knowledge to navigate reaching decisions more effectively. He always embraced change & worked hard with the initial review

of Benefice communication so hopefully this will be embedded in the foundations of our future communication systems?

When Michael stepped down as our Parish Secretary earlier this year it was to take time out with Sue. The pandemic had curtailed their adventures for her birthday last year & their Golden

Wedding in January so he wanted to arrange 50 romantic moments throughout this year!! Sadly this wasn't to be but he did manage the only lockdown fundraiser for the Benefice, a Zoom quiz based on what he had done for the Rotary while he was their President during the lockdowns.

This only gives you an idea of what he gave us in Faversham but his obituary, in both the Times & Telegraph, give you an idea of his academic achievements & the places he had travelled for both work & pleasure.

His commitment to life was so positive & full of God's love. He always let the Light shine through & in his funeral planning he requested donations for a Rotary literacy project & for a community cafe project being planned for Davington church. We now have Blossoms community cafe 2 to 4 pm every Friday & all are welcome to join us for a cuppa (rather than real ale!!). Please spread the word to anyone involved in collecting children from Davington school as it was Michael's wish to get them involved.

Getting to know you

Hello, I'm Nigel Edwards and count Davington as my home in the Benefice.

1 How long have you been in Faversham; have you ever lived anywhere else?

Both my wife and I grew up in the Kentish suburbs of London, moving to Faversham after we were married in 1988. Subsequently, if we allow for the odd technicality, we have lived in all four parishes of the benefice. We live now in Ospringe but attend still the church at Davington where for twenty years we have endeavored to contribute to the needs of the place in response to the friendly welcome we received during the early days.

2 How did you come to your faith?

At age 8 I asked my parents if I could join the local church choir as already I had acquired a deep love for hymns from school assembly. Yet not until my early forties did I seek confirmation in the Church of England. At the classes, generally held in the garden of the vicarage then at Brent Hill, there were four of us- two adults and two twelve year olds-in addition to the vicar, John Hess. At one stage we were asked by John to sing a short prayer. That I found myself capable of this, free altogether from self-consciousness and a fear of appearing ludicrous, was a kind of confirmation in itself!

3 What do you like most about your home church?

Davington Church, though an ancient space with wonderful stained glass through which the floor tiles are dappled with colour on sunny mornings, is a largely unadorned interior and this relative plainness serves as an invitation to prayer and for reflection away from everyday distraction. But those memorial stones that have been added



emphasize the passing of the generations that have shared the space as the world outside has transformed. The transitory nature of things is thus checked and we are drawn beyond the daily limitations.

4 What's your favourite hymn or chorus?

I do feel drawn towards the great anthems and being of Welsh ancestry, am partial to 'Guide Me O Thou Great Redeemer' and 'Alleluia, Sing To Jesus'. Of course there are hymns for all occasions therefore I would add 'Abide With Me'. On my list of favourite compositions there would be around fifty hymns, but probably no more than one or two from the last

hundred years! My favourite carol as a youngster would have been 'Once In Royal David's City'; these days I especially appreciate 'It Came Upon A Midnight Clear'.

5 What is your favourite bit of the Bible and why?

1 Corinthians Chapter 12 is an inspiring message to all of us that we have the opportunity to live through the Spirit towards a personal fulfilment managed by an enduring encounter with faith. Faith, being the lifeblood of the Spirit, is necessary to ourselves as healthy ingredients to the physical being. We shall make mistakes, suffer regrettable and even long-term lapses, but we need never be without this kind of guidance to turn to.
