Revd. Simon writes

Easter Joy.

I was asked recently what we could do about the Ukrainian crisis, I could only suggest prayer to transform the heart of President Putin and the Archbishop leading the Russian Orthodox Church. The chances of such a change of heart seems as I write this as remote. Celebrating Easter, we easily forget how the followers of Jesus must have felt on Easter Saturday. They had witnessed a bloody execution saved for the prisoners Rome wanted to make a spectacle of. Jesus had been publicly mocked by the authorities, city officials and religious leaders, he was forced to walk and carry his cross to the place of execution. During this procession his friends watched on helpless as we watch TV news reports from Ukraine. The execution itself was a long-drawn-out process, as public, painful and slow as was possible.

Roman imperial power at its full might flexed as we have witnessed military technology unleashed. For us today and those watching Jesus no earthly opposition was possible. And yet!

The disciples are hiding away together, and Mary comes, "I have seen the Lord" What was impossible in human history had

been made possible through Christ overcoming death. We celebrate victory over the known finality of human life, the victory of love over hatred. God's order is restored not for then but all time. President Putin will not be the last strong man to use military power and violence to obtain results. As we look at the Ukraine other conflicts rage around our world and people abuse others for their own benefit. Yet in the midst of what seems a hopeless situation we are called to pick up our cross and follow Jesus. To follow Jesus, to face ridicule, to walk in the way that is opposed to world gain, to seek redemption through Jesus Christ who died for each one of us.

Our Easter Joy is to share in the utter surprise and joy of those disciples who must have felt perplexed, emotionally drained, and yet joyful all at the same time. We celebrate with them and all who follow Jesus irrespective of nationality or race for Christ died once and for all. Then rose again and defied death and offers each of us eternal life. That is our Eater joy and our hope for the world.

Israel's Peace Village



Wahat al-Salam Neve Shalom

واحه السلام

My Jewish husband and I, Simon Wolfe (aka St Mary's Bell Tower Captain!) were invited in 2017 to go on a trip to visit Neve Shalom Wahat al Salaam.

The trip was organised by the British Friends of the village and was a multi faith trip to get more than one perspective on the peace initiatives run in the village and by faith organisations outside so as a multi-faith household we ticked their boxes. (Believe me- we have far more tension around Boat Race day in our house as Simon went to the lesser university!).

The village was established in the early 1970's by a Jewish by birth turned Catholic monk, Father Bruno.

He wanted to start a community 50% Jewish 50% Palestinian as a model for living alongside each other in peace. They were the first community to start their own Primary School where all lessons are learned in both Hebrew and Arabic so every child is virtually bilingual when they leave. They also run a School for Peace where courses are put on to educate attendees in peaceful conflict resolution. There is much more information about the various organisations on the Oasis

This November another trip is being organised to Neve Shalom and also to visit a project in Jerusalem, the Anglican church in Ramallah and a Muslim project in Akko.

Simon and I have stayed in the village twice now and it is an experience well worth having if you can. The people in Neve Shalom/ Wahat al Salaam are extremely impressive especially in the face of arson attacks by extremists- 3 in the last 18 months. Be not afraid! Security has been ramped up now!
