So begins the hymn often sung at All Saints or All Souls when we remember, pray for, or think about those whose lives are now past. In the traditional understanding 'the Saints' described in Revelation 18.20 are special holy people whose lives are an exemplar to others as how a Christian should live out their lives. But we are all called to be God's holy people.

In the New Testament followers of Jesus Christ were referred to as followers of the way (Acts 9.2), Christians (Acts 11.26), and by John, Peter, and Paul simply as the saints. The term commonly referred to in Paul's letters as in 'the saints in Ephesus' or the 'saints in Jerusalem'.

I wonder how comfortable or otherwise we would feel as being referred to as the saints in Davington or the saints in Preston ...

If we were called the saints in ..., would it help us in recognising the need to try and model our daily life and behaviour on the person of Jesus Christ? For as Christians we are followers, believers in the person of Jesus Christ.

At All Saints / Souls we remember the lives of all the saints who have gone before us. In doing so we hold our own ending before us and look at our lives in the context of those who have died. In the current Common Worship Funeral Liturgy there is the prayer:

"You are tender towards your children and your mercy is over all your works.

Heal the memories of hurt and failure. Give us the wisdom and grace to use aright the time that is left to us here on earth, to turn to Christ and follow in his steps in the way that leads to everlasting life."

And at the beginning of our commitment to following Christ in the baptism service we have these words:

"God has delivered us from the dominion of darkness and has given us a place with the saints in light.

You have received the light of Christ; walk in this light all the days of your life.

Shine as a light in the world to the glory of God the Father."

As the Saints of Christ, we are called to shine as lights in the world, we remember the 'shinning' saints of the past and seek to model our lives to become more Christ like in our lives to the glory of God the Father.

John Moor 1932 **–**2022

John Moor was born at Hillside Nursing Home in Reading University. Faversham on 17 June 1932.

He spent his early childhood with his parents, brother and sister on a farm that his grandfather had bought for his father at Nichol Farm in the parish of Teynham. In those days, the fruit and vegetables that



they grew were conveyed by horse and cart to market in Sittingbourne.

John started his education at Norton Village School. He never forgot the daily 30 minute sessions of Swedish Drill preceded by the chanting of their 2 - 7 times tables whilst changing into their gym shoes and then chanting their 8 – 13! times tables whilst changing back again.

He was seven years old when World War II broke out and remembered vividly the Barrage Balloons suspended in the air along the coast to protect Britain from the v1 flying bombs, the Doodlebugs.

At this time his family attended Teynham church where his mother did the flowers and his father was a Churchwarden.

and was to influence his later life at Ospringe.

On leaving primary school he went to Faversham Grammar School and at the age of 12 was awarded a scholarship to King's School in Canterbury, which he attended as a border. He excelled at school and then went on to achieve a First Class degree in Botany at

Whilst studying in Reading he managed to pass

his driving test even though he nearly collided with a police car.

During a placement at Mount's Fruit Farm he lodged with a family in South Canterbury Road. Here he met Ruth and it was love at first sight. They

were married in the Undercroft of Canterbury Cathedral in 1956 and their first home was as a top floor flat in a house at Harbledown.

One day John took Ruth for a drive down a country Lane next to Painter's Forstal. When Ruth first saw Bayfield, she exclaimed that she would really like to live there. John replied telling her that it was theirs already! They moved into Bayfield in 1958, a year after their first son was born.

The garden was a dumping ground full of old machinery and the soil was "Farmed Out" but John could see it's potential and at the end of 3 years hard work the land recovered and Bayfield Farm was in business.

They had two more sons and a daughter so the house was extended with the addition of the This obviously made a great impression on John Family Room with bedrooms above it, one of which was built around a lovely C17th Four Poster Bed.

> John was a frustrated academic fully devoted to improving apple growing and research, doing his utmost to improve the industry. At one time there were 26 different cultivars of apples on Bayfield Farm.

There are still 6 grown on Nichol Farm which is now run by his second son and John was proud became well known for his outstanding flower to claim that they are the biggest Organic

Apple and Pear growers in the country.

In 1968, the industry wanted to rename an apple known as Mutso and John suggested Crispin after the youngest of his sons, also being the Patron Saint of Faversham.

John loved classical music, especially Opera. In later life he and Ruth looked forward to their annual summer visits to

Glynebourne and Grange Park which, thanks to their kind friends, they enjoyed to the end despite John's inability to drive due to failing sight.

John and Ruth attended Ospringe Church

where John was sometime Churchwarden and arrangements, often containing a large

> specimen of a plant from his garden which is a network of hidden lawns now surrounded by mature trees and many rare and unusual plants.

In the past it was regularly visited by many under the National Garden Scheme.

He sadly passed away on Tuesday 20 th September and will be greatly missed at Ospringe.

May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

Here are few Titles which have, over the years, enhanced my experience of Advent.


- * The Real Godsend. By Nigel G Wright. An exploration of the birth narratives in Mathew and Luke.

Since we started this fundraising scheme 30 years ago, the procedure is the same: you can visit to choose your tree from late September and return to collect it in December nearer Christmas.

As before, the arrangement is for you to make a donation for your tree; over half will be returned to your Parish church and the rest goes to the 20 charities. This is a great chance for you to raise funds for your Parish church and some deserving charities at the same time.

Parish Lunch


December's Christmas Parish Lunch
